



Tails and Tales at the St. Bernard Parish Library



Eeny meeny miney moe... nope! That won't work. We're not counting tiger toes. We might count tiger tails, or monkey tails, or lion tails, or even duck tails because we are getting ready for a reading safari at the St. Bernard Parish Library. June 1st marks the start of the 2021 annual summer reading program and the theme this year is Tails and Tales.

The St. Bernard Parish Li-

brary has something for readers of all ages. Beginning June 1st, participants can stop by the library's main branch, located at 2600 Palmisano Blvd., in Chalmette, to pick up their 'Grab and Go' registration bags. Bags will include a calendar of events, activity sheets, summer reading treats, and sponsor/supporter info. The six weeks of library fun will come to a close on Friday, July 9th.

While most programs will remain virtual (visit mysbpl.org/ srp2021 for links to everything), the library will have two weekly in-person story sessions. 'In & Out' Stories will take place on Wednesdays at 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. at the library's main branch. Sessions are scheduled to be held indoors. As this will be a group setting in an enclosed space, social distancing may be difficult. Participants are encouraged to wear masks per state and CDC guidelines. All other programming will take place virtually. Grab & Go craft bags that go along with In & Out story time themes will be available following each week's program and can picked up throughout the week while supplies last.

Weekly virtual programming will include a variety of activities starting with Page Turner Adventures. Page Turner and Kenny will be taking readers of all ages on an animal safari. Participants will make everything from coffee filter fish to jungle safari flashlights (Page Turner craft supply lists will be posted on the library's special SRP website). Viewers will be treated to original shows, author/illustrator interviews, virtual field trips and more. Additional virtual activities will include the library's Telling Tales story sessions, sponsor surprise videos, and special quest performances by award winning artists. Defending American Energy Security

Congressman David B. McKinley, P.E. (R-W. Va.) and I re-introduced our resolution to condemn a carbon tax - a resolution that has been introduced every Congress since 2013.

Breeze Airways Announces New Nonstop Flight Service Connecting New Orleans To New Markets

Breeze Airways, a new U.S. carrier from JetBlue founder David Neeleman recently announced its debut network. The new flights will offer service to New Orleans from new markets currently without existing nonstop service.

"As we welcome visitors back to Louisiana, I'm thrilled Breeze Airways is coming to New Orleans," said Lieutenant Governor Billy Nungesser. "With its direct flight offerings, more travelers will have the opportunity to experience how you can Feed Your Soul in Louisiana with delicious food, amazing music and a culture unlike anywhere else in the world."

The New Orleans flights will serve 10 markets: Charleston, SC; Akron/Canton, OH; Bentonville/Fayetteville, AR; Huntsville, AL; Louisville, KY; Norfolk, VA; Oklahoma City, OK; Richmond, VA; Tulsa, OK; and Columbus, OH. The first flight is currently scheduled for July 8.

Neeleman was joined by an experienced team of industry veterans to achieve the goal of building an airline that offers a great experience, with low fares and high flexibility.

"Together, we created Breeze as a new airline merging technology with kindness," said David Neeleman. "Breeze provides nonstop service between underserved routes across the U.S. at affordable fares. A staggering 95 percent of Breeze routes currently have no airline serving them nonstop. With seamless booking, no change or cancellation fees, up to 24-months of reusable flight credit and customized flight features delivered via a sleek and simple app, Breeze makes it easy to buy and easy to fly."

Breeze will operate 13 single-class Embraer aircraft this summer, flying routes with an average flight length of under two hours. The E190 jets will be configured to seat 108 guests and the E195 aircraft will have 118 seats. All aircraft will be a two-by-two seat configuration. Breeze will start taking delivery of 60 brand new Airbus A220 aircraft, beginning in October of this year and delivering at about one per month for five years. The A220 routes, which will be announced this fall, all will be longer than two hours' flight time.

Kiwanis Club Presents Life Saver Award To St. Bernard Fire Department

On May 4th of this year, the Kiwanis Club of St. Bernard/ Arabi presented the Kiwanis Life Saver Award to Fire Department Captain Martin Nehlig for his life saving actions earlier this year.

On January 31 of this year, St. Bernard Parish Fire Department Captain Martin Nehlig and his crew responded to a medical emergency on Jo Ann Court in Violet. Upon arrival, they found a 56-year-old male having difficulty breathing. Captain Nehlig assessed the patient's vitals and administered oxygen. When EMS arrived they took over patient care, but requested a firefighter ride with the ambulance. Captain Nehlig immediately vol-

unteered and assisted with patient care during the ride. While enroute to the hospital, the patient stopped breathing and lost his pulse. The ambulance stopped and pulled off the road. Captain Nehlig requested assistance via his fire department radio and began providing CPR. A Fire Department Rescue Squad arrived on scene and the LU-CAS CPR device was applied to provide flawless chest compressions to the patient. Captain Nehlig continued providing respirations for the patient as the ambulance once again continued to the hospital. Upon arrival at the hospital the patient was transferred to the care of the Emergency Department staff. Due to the extraordinary efforts of Captain Nehlig and his crew,

the patient regained a pulse and tool procedures. began breathing on his own.


During his 17 year career, Captain Nehlig has been involved in numerous lifesaving operations. Captain Nehlig also helps train rookie firefighters assigned to our Second Platoon, continuing their training that started after spending 14 weeks at the LSU State Fire Academy. Captain Nehlig teaches them response protocols, street locations, apparatus operations, and rescue

Chief Thomas Stone says, Captain Nehlig is always smiling, has a "can do" attitude and goes that extra mile when needed without being asked. He has saved the citizens of our Parish, numerous tax dollars making needed repairs to the department's apparatus and stations.

His professionalism and fortitude were displayed during the many rescues the department performed in the aftermath of

Gov. Edwards Announces Three Large-Scale Coastal Restoration Projects in Southeast Louisiana

Gov. John Bel Edwards announced three large-scale coastal restoration projects are now under construction to restore more than 2,900 acres of beach, dune, marsh and ridge in four parishes in Southeast Louisiana. The Spanish Pass marsh restoration near the town of Venice, the West Grand Terre barrier island restoration near Grand Isle, and the Golden Triangle marsh restoration east of New Orleans and Chalmette, will address significant land loss due to erosion and subsidence and restore a combined total of nearly five square miles of coastal land.

"The rebuilding of one of our most important barrier islands in West Grand Terre, along with the restoration of crucial marshland in Spanish Pass and Golden Triangle, are major components in our long-term approach to creating a sustainable coast," said Gov. Edwards. "I'd like to commend CPRA for planning and aggressively advancing these strategic coastal restoration projects to construction. We look forward to watching the continued progress on these projects throughout the year."

All three projects are being accomplished using \$256.6 million in funds resulting from the aftermath of the Deepwater Horizon oil spill. Those funds are administered and approved for use by the Gulf Coast Ecosystem Restoration Council (RESTORE Act), the National Resource Damage Assessment (NRDA), and the Louisiana Trustee Implementation Group (LA TIG).

"Today we're announcing not one but three major restoration projects advancing to construction in Coastal Louisiana," said CPRA Chairman Chip Kline. "West Grand Terre is one of the most historically and ecologically significant barrier islands in Louisiana, and the marsh and ridge restorations of Spanish Pass and Golden Triangle are similarly vital. Today marks an important step forward in protecting and preserving our coastline for generations to come."

The Spanish Pass Increment of the Barataria Basin Ridge and Marsh Creation Project will build more than 1,500 acres of marsh and 132 acres of ridge west of Venice in Plaquemines Parish. The project is part of a large-scale restoration strategy to address land loss in Barataria Basin, where over 10,000 acres of land have been restored since 2007. The estimated total project cost of \$100 million is being funded through NRDA.

"I am delighted to see this massive use of sediment dredged from the Mississippi River used to restore the ecosystem of Venice, one of Louisiana's most-important commercial hubs," said Plaquemines Parish President Kirk Lepine. "This project not only borders Venice, it is also adjacent to the earlier Grand Liard Marsh and Ridge restoration just to the north. Their combined benefits will be appreciated for years to come."

The West Grand Terre Beach Nourishment and Stabilization project, located in Jefferson Parish northeast of Grand Isle, will address the area's significant shoreline erosion and marsh subsidence by restoring over 371 acres of beach and dune and 160 acres of back barrier marsh. Using over 2.9 million cubic yards of material, the West Grand Terre project will construct marsh containment dikes and rock breakwaters to allow for land building and increased protection from wave impacts and storm surge. The estimated total project cost of \$102 million is being funded through RESTORE and NRDA.

"The marshes and bayous along Louisiana's coast serve as the gateway to Jefferson Parish's rich cultural legacy. This \$102 million project on the West Grand Terre Barrier Island is vitally important not only to restore critical habitat for endangered species; but to also secure one of the State's most valuable assets," said Jefferson Parish President Cynthia Lee Sheng. "The CPRA has completed 22 projects in Jefferson Parish since 2008, and has

been an instrumental partner in our fight for coastal restoration. Projects like this are critical in addressing our significant shoreline erosion and marsh subsidence."

By creating and nourishing over 770 acres of marsh habitat, the Golden Triangle Marsh Creation project will reduce storm surge, increase flood protection and restore estuary habitat in Orleans and St. Bernard parishes. The project will support the New Orleans hurricane protection and levee system by restoring the wetland buffer that acts as the area's first line of defense against dangerous storm surge. NRDA is funding the estimated total project cost of \$54 million.

"As we begin another hurricane season, there is no better time to invest in the protection and sustainability of the hundreds of acres of marsh habitat that help mitigate the effects from damaging weather events we see each year," said Mayor LaToya Cantrell. "New Orleans is a coastal city on the frontlines of climate change, and we stand with the Governor and our regional partners to do everything we can to fight coastal land loss. We are grateful for the added level of hurricane protection and levee system support this restoration project will bring to our parish and our neighbors in St. Bernard."

"Restoring the Golden Triangle is incredibly important to the people of St. Bernard Parish," said St. Bernard Parish President Guy McInnis. "The restored marsh will help buffer the recently constructed surge barrier, protecting some of the most populated areas of St. Bernard, and will eventually provide important estuarine habitat for Lake Borgne."

"There will be a lot of boats out there, especially on holiday weekends like the Fourth of July and Labor Day so be careful, slow down and learn and obey the rules of boating safety," Sheriff Pohlmann said. "Don't speed and pay attention to your surroundings. Operate with caution."

Sheriff Pohlmann also stresses the importance of continuing to practice social distancing when on the water, at boat launches and around docks in an effort to further prevent the spread of COVID-19.

The Sheriff also reminds boaters that everyone on board should be wearing a personal flotation device, or life jacket.


"They are available at sporting goods and department stores," the Sheriff said. "Everyone should be able to find one that fits."

With holiday celebrations, also comes the chances of people drinking while operating watercraft. Sheriff Pohlmann reminds residents people can be arrested for drinking and driving on a boat, just as they would be while operating an automobile on land.

Alcohol is a primary cause in nearly 25 percent of all fatal boating accidents nationally, Sheriff Pohlmann said. Statistics also show nearly 90 percent of the boating accidents recorded involve someone who hasn't successfully completed a safe boating class.

Residents interested in taking a boating course can do so for free. Information can be found on the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries web site under the education section. Other state-approved safe boating courses can be found at www.wlf.louisiana.gov/boating/ courses.

Capt. Brian Clark, a retired state Wildlife and Fisheries agent who heads the Sheriff's



Office Marine Division, agrees with Sheriff Pohlmann about the necessity of everyone on board wearing flotation devices, especially children.

"It's required that anyone 17 and under wear a flotation device at all times when a boat is in motion and recommended that adults wear them also," Clark said. Drowning remains the biggest cause of fatalities on the water and a life jacket being worn could save a life, he added.

"Some boaters used to resist them because they were bulky and made it hard to get around on a boat," Clark said, "but the ones made today are lightweight and easy to use."

Before leaving on a trip, Clark recommends informing someone of where you will be going, and approximately when you expect to return.

"Telling someone what your plans are will let them know if you are overdue so they can in-

Office Marine Division, agrees form authorities," Clark said.

Besides flotation devices, Clark said other basic rules for safety include a check of equipment before taking off. He also reminds boaters, if you have a kill switch on the motor, remember to use it if necessary.

Clark said remember to bring important items such as a cell phone and charger, a fire extinguisher, a flashlight, proper clothing, enough food and water for a trip, a safety kit, sunscreen, sunglasses to guard against glare and a device that can be thrown to aid anyone who needs help in the water.

Clark also recommends staying properly hydrated.

"Drink liquids," he said. "Don't let yourself get dehydrated because the sun will take a lot out of you and slow your reaction time."
