Ending Enhanced Unemployment Benefits in Louisiana

I'm pleased to learn that Louisiana will soon end its participation in the enhanced federal unemployment benefits program as we continue to recover from the COVID-19 pandemic and return to normal life. With vaccines being rapidly distributed throughout the country due largely to Operation Warp Speed's success, more Americans are returning to work, and businesses are getting back on their feet.

Our state has seen the negative impacts of continuing to pay workers to stay home. The National Federation of Independent Business found last month that nearly half of small business owners across the country cannot find workers to fill their job openings. Extending these unemployment benefits would only hurt Louisiana's economic recovery if businesses cannot find employees to work and, instead, are forced to compete with the federal government for workers.

Protecting Louisiana's Oil and Gas Workers

I joined Republican members of the House Natural Resources Committee in sending a letter to Interior Secretary Deb Haaland outlining the devastating consequences of the Biden Administration's illegal suspension of new oil and gas leases on federal lands and waters.

Dale Morris Named Charleston's Chief Resilience Officer

Dale Morris, former Director of Strategic Partnerships with the Water Institute, was named the City of Charleston's Chief Resilience Officer last week, providing an opportunity to continue the work he and partners started with Dutch Dialogues Charleston more than three years ago.

"When Dale joined the Water Institute in 2018, he brought with him decades of experience in working with communities to develop tailored approaches for resilience," said Justin Ehrenwerth, the Water Institute president and CEO. "The Water Institute team can't thank him enough for his dedication, drive, and passion for community resilience. Charleston has found the perfect advocate and resilience leader. Our sincere congratulations to Dale and his family on this exciting new position."

At the Water Institute, Dale was instrumental in the formation of the Institute's support for the City of Houston and, in

particular, the "Living with Water" strategy developed in the wake of Hurricane Harvey. Dale worked with a diverse group of partners to take lessons learned in New Orleans following Hurricane Katrina and applied them to Charleston as they develop their own flood mitigation measures, and he started work on Virginia's development of a Coastal Resilience Master Plan.

Although Dale joined the Water Institute in 2018 as the Director of Strategic Partnership, his experience with the Institute and south Louisiana stretches back many years.

"It has been my honor to serve the Water Institute's leadership and work alongside its brilliant, committed staff. The Institute's science and decision-support knowledge will be essential in Louisiana and coastal communities in the coming years," Morris said. "My experience at Institute will guide me as I work to build more resilience in the City of Charleston."

Post Hurricane Katrina, Morris coordinat-

ed and directed the Royal Netherlands Embassy's and Dutch Government's recovery outreach to Louisiana, with a focus upon flood risk assessment, mitigation and integrated water management for storm surge, tidal, stormwater and groundwater flooding. Dale was also part of the team assembled by CPRA, the Baton Rouge Area Foundation and Senator Mary Landrieu to establish The Water Institute of the Gulf.

During this work, Dale co-founded the Dutch Dialogues with Waggonner & Ball, focused upon urban water management challenges and opportunities in post-Katrina New Orleans. Dutch Dialogues have been organized elsewhere in the U.S., leading to far-reaching planning, policy, and regulatory improvements in flood-prone and flood-recovering communities. Most recently, this approach was used in Charleston and has been embraced by community leaders as a way forward for a city under threat from sea level rise.

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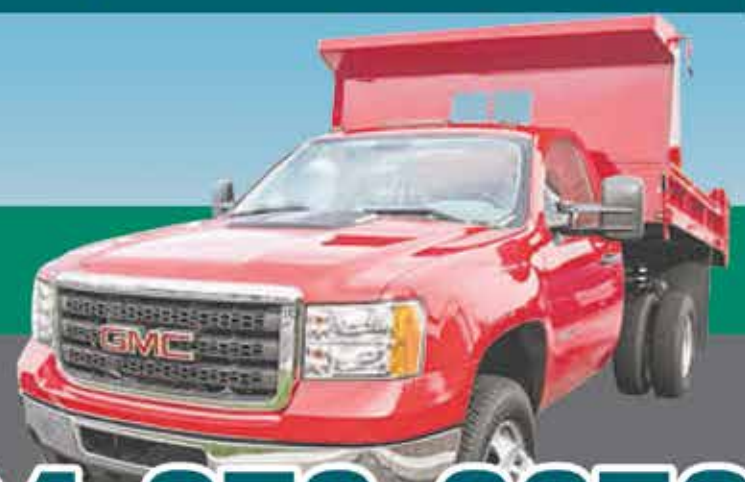


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Seven Girl Scouts In Southeast Louisiana Earn Their Gold Award, The Girl Scouts' Highest Achievement

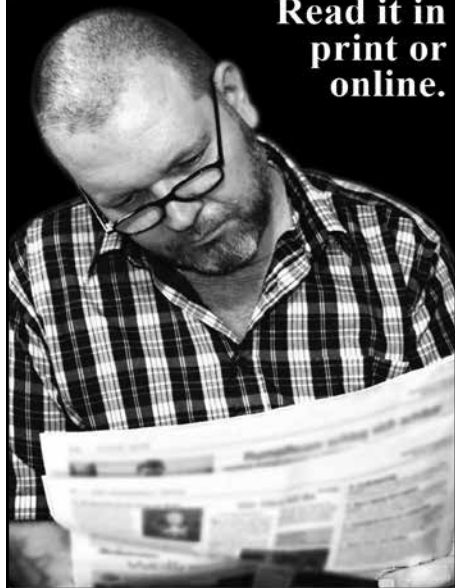

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Cut The Cost Of Keeping Cool This Summer

Many people think of an air conditioner as something that circulates cool air through their home, but what it really does is remove heat and moisture from the air. So, an understanding of how heat enters the home is the key to choosing the most cost-effective ways to cut summer utility bills, while staying cool and comfortable, said Claudette Hanks Reichel, LSU AgCenter housing specialist and director of LaHouse.

According to an analysis by the Florida Solar Energy Center, the main sources of heat gain in homes during the summer, in order of greatest to smallest, are:

1. Windows (solar heat gain through glass)
2. Duct system (air leaks and absorbed heat)
3. Roof and attic
4. Internally generated heat (appliances, electronics, cooking, bathing, etc.)
5. Air infiltration (outside air leaking into the home)
6. Walls

"Although the amount of heat gain from each source varies among houses and lifestyles, the top five tend to offer the greatest opportunity to save money and stay cool in Louisiana's hot and humid climate," Reichel said. She offered advice to keep homes cool during summer's heat.

1. Shade windows. Sun-control strategies can provide the greatest bang for the buck. An exterior shading strategy should be used for any glass that receives direct sunshine or heat radiating from pavement. Interior window treatments like blinds help but are not nearly as effective as exterior or glass solar control.

Solar screens, or shade screens, are an inexpensive, do-it-yourself strategy that can block up to 70% of solar heat while preserving the view. The screening fabric is easy to install in aluminum screen frames with a spline. The energy savings can surpass the cost in one or two summers.

Solar films (heat control film applied to the interior side of glass) are available with

a range of properties to serve a home's needs. A solar heat gain coefficient (SHGC) under 0.4 (meaning it admits 40% and blocks 60% of radiant heat) and a visible light transmittance (VT) of 0.5 or greater is optimal. The lower the SHGC the better; the higher the VT the better. Do-it-yourself kits are available but take a bit of finesse to avoid air bubbles.

If planning to install new windows, choose units that are Energy Star certified. Energy Star windows for the southern region will have an SHGC of 0.25 or lower.

Landscaping is a great way to shade both glass and walls as well as add value to a home. Awnings are another good option with aesthetic benefits, but they are costlier.

2. Test and improve ductwork. In a typical home, ductwork might lose 30% or more of its cooling, which costs money. This is due to ducts in most homes in the south being in the hottest part of a home: the attic, which tend to be quite leaky. Leaky ducts mean both air conditioning the outdoors and causing a home to draw in hot, humid outdoor air to make up for the leaked air.

It's a great investment to have ducts leak-tested by a trained professional with specialized equipment, then have all leaks sealed with mastic tape rather than duct tape. It is also helpful to add duct insulation when feasible and improve its layout to correct tight bends and crimps.

3. Block attic heat. If a home has a vented attic, it can become much hotter than the outdoor temperature. To combat this, find and seal air leaks in ceilings, around chimneys and any other bypasses. This can also reduce dust in a home. If space permits, increase attic floor insulation to R-38.

If the air conditioner and ducts are in the attic, a radiant barrier system can reduce the heat-up of ductwork and the attic by blocking radiant heat from the hot roof. This can be a do-it-yourself project by stapling reinforced foil radiant barrier to rafters, shiny side down.

Powered roof vents are not recommended. They not only use energy but can also create a suction in the attic that pulls air from the living space into the attic. That can result in higher energy bills because the attic is being cooled with the conditioned air.

4. Produce less heat indoors. In general, every three kilowatt-hours of energy saved in the home can reduce the need for cooling by one additional kWh, saving energy and money two ways.

Leaving computers, TVs, lights and even ceiling fans on add heat needlessly. Ceiling fans can save energy by keeping a home cooler at higher thermostat settings, but they waste energy if are left on in unoccu-

pied rooms. Turning everything off when not needed costs nothing. If that seems like a difficult habit to enforce, install and use timers or motion sensors.

When replacing appliances, look for the Energy Star label. Investing in high efficiency pays off. Refrigerators and freezers are especially important because they run — and give off heat — continuously.

Replace incandescent light bulbs with LEDs or compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs). They have a higher price tag, but use about one-fourth the electricity, produce one-fourth the heat and last 10 to 20 times longer — thus staying cooler and saving money in the long run.

Consumers should also think about ways to reduce heat-making activities. This can be accomplished by cooking with a microwave oven and outdoor grill. Waiting for full loads to run the dishwasher is also a good way to save, as is using less hot water for laundry and showers.

5. Cool more efficiently. Last but not least, air conditioning systems should be professionally cleaned and serviced to keep them running as efficiently as possible. Changing the air filter as recommended on its label is important. A dirty filter that restricts air flow causes a big loss of efficiency.

When it's time to replace an air conditioner, investments in a Seasonal Energy Efficiency Ratio (SEER) of 14 to 16 or an Energy Star qualified model should be made, as is making certain it is sized correctly. Bigger isn't necessarily better. An oversized air conditioner cools the space too quickly, resulting in short cycles that do not dehumidify adequately. An oversized unit also will cost more to buy and more to operate, and it will not last as long.
